

Report on Flipped Classroom Activity

Objective of the Activity:

The primary goal of this flipped classroom activity was to enhance student's understanding of effective communication techniques. By engaging in a flipped classroom activity, the aim was to allow students to explore key concepts and practice communication skills through peer interaction and application, rather than just passively receiving information.

Pre-Class Preparation:

Prior to the class session, students were assigned the following materials:

- 1. Video Lectures: Students watched on their smart mobile a series of short videos on the basics of effective communication, including verbal and non-verbal cues, active listening, and how to communicate clearly and persuasively.
- 2. Reading Material: A handout that explained communication models, barriers to communication, and methods for overcoming them.
- 3. Self-Assessment: Students completed a brief survey about their current communication skills and challenges they face while communicating.

In-Class Activity:

The in-class session was structured as follows:

In-Class Activity:

1. Introduction (8:10 AM - 8:20 AM):

2. Group Discussions and Role Play (8:20 AM - 8:40 AM):

- Students practiced the skills they had learned, including active listening, body language, tone modulation, and effective verbal communication.
- Groups took turns presenting their role plays in front of the class.

3. Peer Feedback and Reflection (8:40 AM - 8:55 AM):

- After each presentation, classmates and the instructor provided constructive feedback, focusing on what worked well and areas for improvement.
- Students reflected on their own communication strengths and weaknesses, offering insights into how they could improve their skills in real-life situations.

4. Wrap-up and Q&A (8:55 AM - 9:10 AM):

- The instructor summarized the key takeaways from the activity and opened the floor for any final questions.
- Students were encouraged to continue practicing communication skills outside of class and to be mindful of both verbal and non-verbal elements in daily interactions.

Outcomes and Key Takeaways:

• Enhanced Understanding of Communication Models: Students gained a deeper understanding of communication models and how they can apply these theories in real-life scenarios.

- Practical Application of Skills: The hands-on role play allowed students to actively practice communication techniques and receive immediate feedback.
- Increased Confidence in Communication: Students expressed greater confidence in their ability to communicate effectively, both in academic and social contexts.
- Peer Learning: The flipped classroom format fostered collaboration and peer-to-peer learning, making students more engaged and participative in the learning process.

Challenges:

- Some students initially struggled with the role-playing aspect, particularly those who were less comfortable with public speaking.
- A few students felt they needed more time to fully absorb the video material before the in-class session.

Recommendations for Future Sessions:

- Additional Preparation: Providing more structured guidelines and examples for the pre-class material could help students feel more prepared for in-class activities.
- Extended Role Play Sessions: Allowing more time for role-playing and feedback would enable students to refine their communication skills further.
- Varied Activities: Incorporating different communication exercises such as group debates, problem-solving tasks, or persuasive speech activities would diversify the learning experience.


Conclusion:


